EVENTS OF THE MONTH

IT'S WINTER...

It's cold and wet, a winter well away from home...



12 January, Calais



12 January, Dunkerque

It is a weather where everyone first needs to protect themselves from the rain, even if it is with a simple garbage bag.

But it was also very cold, with a wind that cuts in two and negative temperatures. The puddles froze.



Here is the state of a volunteer's equipment at the end of a marauding... And that of the police during a dismantling...



And that of an exile who has no way to do his laundry or take a daily shower, how is he?



THE DEMANTELING OF CAMPS CONTINUE.

The forces of order are always in number:

In Calais it is always on average every other day. On 8th and 22nd January there was a lack of this infernal rhythm, but there were dismantlings two days in a row on 4 and 5 January.



Nothing on January 31, yet six CRS vans were ready, but a policeman told the HRO that they were there for the demonstration. This is a first: even at the height of the movement of “yellow vests” there was no relaxation in the rhythm of the evacuations.



The ground is so wet that the underside of the bridges is one of the few preserved places. But the tents are removed from there as elsewhere.

On January 12, the HRO sees the CRS take the guys out of their tent with their belongings despite the rain and wind. As always, the tents are moved when the Police arrive..



... to be reinstalled right after

In one of their videos of the day (12th January) an HRO member is heard telling the riot police: "Actually they will just leave and resettle; it makes no sense." Unsurprisingly, the CRS do not respond.

The remaining belongings, those of absentees, are considered abandoned and are removed.

Law enforcement is too often threatening.

On 27 January at 8.40 a.m., a peaceful dialogue can be heard in an HRO video between a young man and the Deputy Commissioner of Calais. We'll see if the message got through...



- Can you tell your colleagues... Why do they put their gas like that, in the form of intimidation? Last time, you didn't do it like that...

- I will tell their officer.

- I am responsible for the device, but they answer their officer first.

- Because suddenly, it can be perceived as a form of intimidation.

- You can see that no one is being bullied. If the police were impressive, it would have been known a long time ago.




In addition to the dismantling, there are obstacles to the assistance provided by associations. In Calais on January 19, rue de Judée, one of the water tanks of Calais Food Collective was removed and rocks were added to prevent the access of vehicles.

In Dunkirk, the aim seems to be to definitively empty the dregs inhabited for a year in Loon-Plage and to concentrate the population on the new place at Mardyck, where the exiles had been encouraged to settle on 7 December by the relocation of the water tanks of Roots. But the camp spills over into Total's land There were three evacuations in January: on the 4th, 12th and 26th.



We read in the CR distribution of Thursday 12th by Geneviève: "There was not enough wind and rain during the night, it is 12 or 15 CRS buses that sounded the alarm clock and dismantling ... of our migrant friends!

Yes, but around 1pm (shortly after Salam's team) there arrived a large van of "Help 4 Dunkirk" which distributed two blankets to many of them, always in a light rain ... and they then rushed to Salam's truck for the stock of garbage bags on board and to put their blankets a little dry...! And let's not talk about the shoes claimed and the areas where they "camp", flooded, seen on our way coming ... »
 Only one AFEJI bus is there to provide shelter. On the 26th there are only about thirty people who leave.



Dismantling near Dunkirk is regularly accompanied by deforestation.

But it is, in any case, a desolate ground that we discover after an evacuation ...



OPENING OF THE COLD WEATHER PLAN.

It was so cold that on our two cities the sub-prefectures triggered the opening of shelters for the night: **In Calais**, it was first decided from 17th to 19th January, first with one night and then from the 20th to the morning of 24th January, then until 25th. The opening resumes after a night's break (Why? Was it really hotter, or even less cold than the others?) from the evening of the 26th to the morning of the 30th.

In Dunkirk the gymnasium of Fort Louis was opened on January 16th for three nights, and until the 24th also from the 18th then until the 25th, finally until the morning of the 30th. Only families will be welcomed, it was written on the 18th, but in the end all were accepted.

Still some failures in operation: the buses that are responsible for taking people to the gymnasium for the night do not leave from the camp site to which they were pushed back on December 7th, but from the old site, far from the new. Compulsory depot is important and discouraging, especially for those with young children.



Even the small bridge set up as a shortcut in December...

... was destroyed during the evacuation of January 4th...

... and a pipe (of what ?) was destroyed at the same time.

The gymnasium is however, visibly quite welcoming: from night to night there are more volunteers (we have gone from forty the first night to a number approaching a hundred, Sunday 22nd).

What is difficult to understand is that there were dismantling in the morning during these periods of shelter for the night... The closure of the premises for the day is announced at 9:30 a.m. in Calais, at 9 a.m. in Dunkirk.

But in Calais, on the 20th the convoy was spotted by the HRO on the sites at 8:11 a.m. on January 27 at 8:27 a.m. On Dunkirk, on the 26th the evacuation convoy arrived on the terrain at 8:39 a.m.

As always, the belongings of the those who are not there are considered abandoned and picked up by the cleaning company that accompanies the Police. ...

It was noted that in Dunkirk the evacuation did not concern the most recent camp (the one that overflows in Mardyck on the lands of Total). But nothing said in the information transmitted by the Carrefour des Solidarités that sheltering was reserved for them...

We remind you that the bitter cold would make it essential to shelter 24 hours a day, but if it is proposed for the night, at least people can enjoy it until the last minute. They must not leave their shelter in a hurry, before it closes, to watch over their equipment before it is removed.

"But it's only one night! (or two, for that matter)", we will of course be objected to...

It is more than enough to break trust in the authorities, especially if it is already non-existent or very, very fragile...

We begin to dream that the cancellation of the evacuation of January 22nd is the result of a burst of humanity. It would be the first time in Calais...

DISTRIBUTIONS :

On Dunkirk, the place of distribution planned (and we are grateful to them) by the Port Autonome is still too small and muddy. The distributions, ours the first, are on a wide and tarmacked space on which it is easy to install and ask for a clean "line".



But we know that the place belongs to Total. We count the days of tolerance and are very careful to clean the waste to annoy as little as possible.



We are used to seeing families, large, on the side of Dunkirk. On January 10th, Marie wrote to us in P.S. of a report: "The little Afghan girls had a beautiful smile, charming eyes. Little girls who deserved more than to live in a tent and in the mud. »

We distribute what we can like coats, clothes, boots... and some tents in the evening for those who arrive and have nothing.

We see Indians coming, big guys with a turban and a silver bracelet... This is new on both sites. They don't eat meat. We get into the habit of preparing and offering a vegetarian tin. A moment of relaxation for us, it feels good even if the atmosphere was very serene, when one of them tells us very seriously: "Yes vegetarian, but with chicken! »

THE SMALL BOATS.

At the coldest moment, these families have almost all gone to shelter, in CAES, for a few days, to keep the children warm ... There were almost none left at the distributions.

But before the weekend of 21st / 22nd January we saw them back in numbers: the wind had calmed down a little, the smugglers had announced that the crossings were resuming. Indeed, that weekend and during the beginning of the following week, we had announcements of passages, but also saw many people return after a failure ...

Thursday 26th, Marie sends us this testimony: "This morning my husband met about fifty people loaded with blankets and bags at the height of the wood of Leffrinckoucket, very quiet ... ». It's a "back to square one... " she adds.

1,745 successful passages in December according to the Home Office. Not far from 1,200 announced on January 30th (despite the storms) by the British Ministry of Defense, according to the site "GB Britain's news Channel" including 189 Sunday 29th. These figures do not take into account those who arrive discreetly.

The police are trying to prevent them from leaving by all means: on January 1st, volunteers from Salam in Calais see on the road to Waldam (by the sea, between Calais and Gravelines) four large groups of exiles, sitting on the ground, with police vans in front of them. It makes no sense to prevent people from settling and at the same time prevent them from leaving places without water and toilet points... The work of associations is to help them survive, in the first sense, not to die. It is not to help them in passing but not to prevent them from doing so...

Some arrive with the image of a reception center that we also dream of: on January 6th, the Calais team sees a group of Algerians, undoubtedly adults, well dressed, with impeccable shoes, who were looking for the "hotel" of the camp. What an image of the France they send back to us...

Another, rue des Huttes, on January 18th, was looking for the boat to England. "Finished Boats?" he asked angrily.

The shelters requested are sometimes absurd: on January 9th, still rue des Huttes in Calais, a young Iranian woman is sent on a different bus from that of her brothers (therefore to a different destination). They are adults, they do not meet the definition of a "family".

But what a terrible idea is that of these people sitting on an inflatable in the middle of a freezing sea, and it is no more acceptable for adults than for children...

The news of the suicide of the young Sudanese on January 3 (see already the December newsletter) remains present in all our heads...

For you
We don't know your name
But we've seen you often
Alone in distribution
Your gaze extinguished and closed
Standing filled with loneliness
Often we were worried about you... For your future
A future destroyed by inhumane living conditions.
How sad to know this gesture of despair...
That sad end of you...
We think of you, this stranger,
Death in Calais... Again and again.

THE COURTS HAVE NOT SPARED US THIS MONTH.

The prefect appealed against the annulment of the decrees banning the distribution of free food and drink in certain streets of Calais:

We receive on January 21 the following message from the PSM: "We come back to you to inform you that, as we could imagine, the prefect of Pas-de-Calais has appealed against the judgment of October 12, 2022 rendered by the administrative court of Lille. »

The Town Hall of Calais wins in summary Useful measures the evacuation of the George V, Faidherbe and Mollien bridges as well as the neighbouring quays: the information is taped on the spot.

This judgment is taken against occupants of the public domain without right or title. It takes into account (it reads...) the "requirements attached to respect for one's dignity and private and family life" and will therefore be accompanied by care in reception centres (we unfortunately know the inadequacy of this care). It is based, among other things, on the fact that there is "no drinking water, no electricity, no sewage and sanitary waste disposal system". (NB We do not disagree but know that the places likely to receive the exiles after their evacuation will be just as devoid of them).



HOWEVER, THE AMBIANCE IS SOMETIMES AT THE PARTY:

On January 11, in a Spanish inn, the Grande-Synthe team pulled the kings.

Twenty teenagers from the Ukrainian city of Boutcha are expected in Dunkirk from January 31st as part of an exchange program initiated by Patrice Vergriete and Anatolii Fedoruk, mayor of Butcha. During their stay they will participate in many activities in different places of our city and will meet high school students from the Erasmus lycé eJean Bart class as well as students of other nationalities as part of the European program (Sweden, Italy, Ireland and Poland).

The arrival of these 20 young Ukrainians is made possible thanks to the help of Europe Prykhystok (word meaning "shelter" in Ukrainian), an association that supports people fleeing the war, in close collaboration with the Urban Community of Dunkirk.

Dunkirk hopes to share its experience of resilience with this hard-hit city and forge strong cultural ties and exchanges for the future. Boutcha could thus join the network of memory cities that Dunkirk animates.

TENTS AND TARPAULINS!

From dismantling to dismantling, the tents are removed at both sites and we are unable to replace them. Many people sleep with nothing on them, in all weathers.

But we hesitate to suggest you buy some: the life expectancy of a tent is a few days...

On the other hand, tarpaulins, pieces of 3m by 3m (or 2.50 m by 3), cost much less and allow an honest man to spend a night in the shelter.

Otherwise, the most pressing needs on both sites:

BLANKETS (DUVETS, SLEEPING BAGS).

hygiene products (shampoo, shower gel, deodorant, sunscreen, etc.), especially razors, towels,

men's clothing from XS to XL: underpants, thermal leggings and thermal sweaters, socks, jogging pants, jeans, shorts, t-shirts,

SHOES for men: trainers or light hiking shoes (European sizes 40 to 46), sandals, caps.

backpacks,

lamps and batteries,

water packs,

bags (small backpacks, garbage bags, freezer bags, tote bags and plastic bags)

Food for Calais:

Milk

tea and sugar, instant soluble coffee,

cans of sardines and cans of tuna,

cream of cheese,

dried fruits,

Power banks

And for Grande-Synthe:

Especially canned vegetables of all kinds (we have been receiving much less fresh for some time), bags of pulses, spices,
