EVENTS OF THE MONTH

DEATHS.

In the first week of 2025, the list of deaths for the month was... a blank page. It felt so good...

Unfortunately, three deaths followed...

The first, was a man found on the side of the A16 road on 8th January, near Grande-Synthe. Is it a person who was hit by a vehicle, a hit-and-run accident? At first, we thought so... But it can also be someone who died in a camp, who was dropped there to be found. It has already happened, unfortunately. We will probably never know.

The usual commemoration took place at 6:30pm the next day, 9th January in Calais, Richelieu Park, and the day after on the Malo-les-Bains in Dunkirk.

It was so cold that we slipped gently from the evocation of the deceased to that of the living: the air was icy but absolutely windless: a weather that would put a dinghy on the water... We were certain that some were on their way and that the one who fell into the water was dead... It was with them in mind, that we parted...



On the morning of 11th January, another death, that of a young Syrian, was announced to us on the beach of Sangatte. Once again there is uncertainty about the cause of death: someone who has had a cardiac arrest in the water because of the cold? This is what was first announced. Then we heard that the man had been crushed by others in the boat... We'll never validate either report, the second version is so much more horrible, that we would rather not believe it...

As usual, the commemoration took place at 6:30 pm the next day, 12th January in Calais, Richelieu Park, and the day after on the Malo-les-Bains in Dunkirk.

On the morning of 22nd January, the body of a young Yemeni was found on the beach of Sangatte, probably drowned a short time ago...

The commemorations took place on $23^{\rm rd}$ January (in Calais) and $24^{\rm th}$ (in Dunkirk) ...

A WINTER WEATHER.

January brought cold and frost.

On 12th January, in Calais, the water supply point on Rue des Huttes froze... It is the only water point in the city accessible to exiles 24 hours a day...

Quite quickly, shelters for the night were decided by the local authority.

On the evening of Friday 3rd January until Monday morning 6th January, then until Tuesday 14th, the Great Cold Plan was activated in Calais. After two nights without shelter, it was reactivated, in several stages, from Thursday 16th to Wednesday 23rd in the morning. Access is by shuttle bus from 4:30 p.m. to 6:30 p.m.

The associations in Dunkirk (including Salam) had called for an identical decision. On the afternoon of Friday 3rd we finally learn that, in the evening, a gymnasium would be open in Petite-Synthe for several nights, it will also be extended, in several times, until Wednesday morning 23rd January. The night shelter, supervised by the Red Cross, is reserved for those who have registered with the AFEJI to leave at 5 p.m. with a shuttle. (Afeji Hauts-de-France association acts for the inclusion of all and supports all vulnerable people, from early childhood to old age)

The night ends at 8am in Dunkirk, officially at 9am in Calais...

In Dunkirk, this shelter is accompanied by an evening meal, breakfast and access to a hot shower. In Calais, nothing is offered more than what is offered daily in terms of shuttles to the showers and food distributions by "La Vie Active". "La Vie Active", is a secular non-profit association, that aims to promote the dignity of disabled or vulnerable people.

That's good, of course, but nothing was offered for the day, neither in Calais nor in Dunkirk...

In that weather, however, you wouldn't even leave a dog outside!

We asked with an inter-associative email that at least people be able to arrive all night, especially those who are outside after a rescue at sea or a shipwreck...

The cold weather did not slow down the pace of dismantling (see below). This photo from the HRO (Human Rights Observers) on the morning of 14th January gives an idea of the negative temperature that prevailed:





THE PASSAGES TO ENGLAND .

The cold does not prevent departures.

One of us on 17th January, saw on the road that runs along the sea from Gravelines a group of men who were carrying a huge zodiac dinghy. Apparently, it was very heavy, they had trouble moving forward... On the same day, the Calais distribution team saw a group gathering with backpacks and life jackets, and even families with strollers..

There are many missed passages.

On 5th January, our team in Calais came across a group of about fifty women, one of whom had fallen into the water and had to be hospitalized.

On the 11th, at the Quai de la Moselle, a group of about fifty people showed up for breakfast, they just came out of the water, soaked and covered in sand.

The next day in the same place, there were 80 of them in life jackets: they had missed the crossing. On the 18th on the road, the distribution team stopped to give breakfast to about fifteen Iranians who had also just missed a crossing.

And these are just examples of what is happening day in, and day out.

But we are surprised by the number of successes:

The Home Office announced 1,098 crossings on 20 dinghies between 4th and 22nd January inclusive (nothing at the end of the month).

This makes almost 55 people on average per boat, but 129 on 2 boats on the 21st, that is to say, 64 or 65 per boat.... That's enormous..

The minimum is 39 or 40 per dinghy on the 22nd (79 out of 2), a figure closer to those of two years ago... A year ago (January 2024), there had been still, according to the Home Office, 1,057 crossings on 23 dinghies (46 people per boat).

The proof is in the pudding: police pressure does not reduce the number of crossings; it just makes them more deadly.....


These figures do not take into account those who are not greeted by the Border Force on arrival, nor those who entered by truck.

On 14th January, Olivier wrote on an inter-associative WhatsApp group:

"Yesterday at the showers, many people told me they were trying to get through by boat or truck."

Indeed, as we said above, the water is so cold that the chance of survival in the event of a fall into the water is almost zero.

We are therefore not surprised that lorry crossings are again being attempted more often, and the number of entries in the United Kingdom is necessarily higher than the figure announced by the Home Office.



The Human Rights Observer was able to capture a photo of police officers on the beach on 4th January. They have prevented the departure of a dinghy and take pictures of it as a hunting trophy...

THE EVACUATIONS. In Calais:

The rhythm to which we had been accustomed since this summer (three times a week on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays) resumed from the second week of the year. The first week was still a festive period, the dismantling was lightened as in December, there were only two: Tuesday 31st December and Thursday 3rd January.



This policy, which is less rigorous, has been applied regularly since 7th August; This is worth pointing out, even if it is still overly brutal for those who suffer from it on the ground.

But the cold and the icy wind of this period do not slow down the pace...

The photo shows a tent just seized (6th January, Danube Quay) blown by the wind.

On 20th January, on rue de Judée, a security perimeter was set up without the police getting out of their cars, it was so cold...

The police are generally extremely numerous... But why?? The photo was taken in Marck on 22nd January.





The security perimeters are always extremely large, they often make the Human Rights Observers observation work almost impossible. Yet this is their role as "Human Rights Observers." We see fewer and fewer "human" perimeters, i.e. a line of police officers who block the road. We see at least one on 15th January.

On 31^{st} January, at the Stade du Courgain East, the HRO (Human Rights Observers) asked a riot police officer why they could not observe the operations.

The answer was: "There is a reason but I can't give it to you"...

A little later, on rue de Judée, another CRS (Republican Security Corps) justifies, this time, the security perimeter and their presence:

"We are here to protect you". He doesn't say from what...

And he adds that they are counting because "we are not going to let them die of hunger and cold". Indeed, he says, the services of the prefecture provide food and care.

Someone from the HRO then asks why we take their tents if we want to protect them from the cold. The police officer assures that there is no eviction, just a report every 48 hours that the land is occupied.

"Come before and after an intervention, you will see that there are the same number of tents."

However, there were at least three tents seized that day (from what the HRO was able to see) Quai de la Gironde...



On 3rd January, on rue de Judée, the National Police asked the CRS, in front of them, not to let the HRO pass.

On 20th January at the Stade du Courgain East, a security perimeter was established, with a police car. The HRO is not even allowed to walk along the fence.

On 15th January, the police were armed, the photo was taken by the HRO at the Courgain stadium, east..

On the 24th, batons were reported by the HRO, on the 29th an LBD..

On 6th January, at Pont Mollien, the cleaning team emptied tents to take them away.

The Salam team that distributes Quai de la Moselle sees the municipal staff seize all the tents on the quays. And on the 24th, the HRO concluded its report on the dismantling in the city centre with: "All the tents on the quays have been taken".

We always notice the difference between the way the exiles evacuate their tents so that they are not picked up and that of the cleaning teams: the exiles carefully lift them so that they do not get damaged (in the photo, it looks like they have legs), while the cleaning agents drag them on the ground without any concern for their condition.







The amount of material seized, even if it's a few at a time, is ultimately impressive (the photo was taken on 22nd January on a BMX.)



The Fontinettes camp was completely razed to the ground on the morning of 29th January, very early.

On 29th January, the police intervened on the Quai de la Moselle during the breakfast given by Salam. They prevented those who had come to eat from coming back to pick up their belongings. Too bad for them, they were picked up... The guys are worried, they know that there have been arrests in the previous days. One of them complained that the day before, he had been woken up in his tent by blows from a policeman. We feel that they are trying to stay with us... but we are expected at the other distribution points...



Arrests, in fact, are not exceptional (in the photo, in Marck, on 24th January).

On the 26th, the HRO noted 7 arrests in the city in the past week. A heavy police presence at the station was reported between 11th and 16th January (this is the period when sea crossings were the most numerous)

On 8th January, a policeman said that it was a "sheltering" operation, the HRO pointed out that it was a strange sheltering operation where you take tents and where there is no bus offering transport to accommodation...

On the 13th, a CRS said that he took migrants to sleep in his home *(sic)*, while "you let them die with their mouths open in tents... At home, they are not that unhappy..." This gentleman says that he spent ten years in Africa.

On the 15th in Marck, another CRS said that this perimeter was justified by the attacks, because one of their colleagues had died on the Champs Elysées.

On 24th January, the riot police opened a Salam van during distribution and carried out a proper inspection of the contents. They were looking for something they couldn't find... We still wonder what...

To Dunkirk,

The rhythm had been very slow since the beginning of August (6th and 23rd August – 11th, 25th and 27th September – 9th, 22nd and 30th October – 20th November), but in the freezing cold we saw the evacuation convoys arrive a week apart on 7th and 14th January, then on 27th January...

There is not, as in past years, a spectacular deployment of construction machinery, but destroyed sites::

*On the 27th, the dismantling, on the Total site and near the Matthews site, very close to the A16, did not tire of anything.





Even two kettles were not spared, one of the few objects that allow the exiles to warm up a little.

There were at least three arrests on the 7th and the exiles at the bus stop told the HRO that the police had used the gas..

On the 14th, the CRS were brutal: they had helmets and shields, they shouted their orders. They shoved the HRO and threatened to report them to the SNCF (Railway) so that they could be fined for "entering a railway zone, it's a crime."

A police officer says that the legal basis for their operation is "assistance to a bailiff". Indeed, there is one on the ground; he says that he does have a requisition from the Prosecutor but that it is in his pocket. Several buses were waiting at the Palais du Littoral, only two will come to the field, one after the other. That morning, the HRO underwent 3 successive identity checks, the third by the port police... Tents were seized..

LIVING CONDITIONS.

The winter living conditions do not make our authorities more compassionate for the exiles..

Indeed, **in Calais**, we learned on 8th January that, for two days, "La Vie Active" in Calais had not gone to BMX to offer its usual services (food distribution, shuttles to showers, etc.).

A phone call confirmed that they were no longer allowed to go there and that there was no alternative location planned.

It was therefore necessary to direct the people concerned to the distribution points on Rue des Huttes and Rue de Judée. But it is a long way off and they had not been informed of this change.

In Dunkirk too, even in the hours when the thermometer went above zero, during the day the winter conditions were undignified.

We distribute with our feet in the water to people who have their feet in the water...

On 24th January, however, after a text message from Salam to the Director General of the Urban Community of Dunkirk, a delivery of sand to dry and stabilise the land was announced. As Jean-Claude Lenoir told us on 25th June, just after a meeting of the representatives of associations with those of the CUD: "No law prohibits being more generous than the State!" Thank you CUD!

Good news :

The PASS in Grande-Synthe opened on Wednesday, 22nd January, for general consultations. People can go on Tuesdays from 1 pm to 4:30 pm, one afternoon a week to start...





A protest demonstration against the conditions of life – and death – in our camps, was organised on 11th January in Calais.



Salam volunteers were widely represented. (Even though our logo doesn't appear, we signed the appeal!)



One of our volunteers, blocked by health problems, tells me on the phone that when she can't join a demonstration or a rally, to feel closer to us, she lights a small electric candle at home that I left her at a previous meeting... It is a very beautiful, very moving participation that she offers us...

"It is essential that the associative movement, the only guarantor of citizen engagement, remains present, democracy needs you, Our friends need you. » wrote Jean-Claude Lenoir, in the president's note of the month of January 2016 of this newsletter.

- On 26th January, we were in Templeuve, Elisabeth, Jean and Claire, invited by Brigitte and Jean-Noël.

For a long time, they have regularly brought us donations from collections, and agricultural tarpaulins to protect the tents from the rain.

After a large collection in the parishes near their homes, they had collected so much that their car was no longer big enough to bring everything..

We decided to make a round trip to Templeuve in a van (one trip was not enough!) and to group the trip with a meeting that they were organizing, in Cysoing, between the public and representatives of associations who, like us, are doing their best to help the exiles. It was a success: there were a lot of people.....

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And we were able to have very interesting exchanges with small groups.

2025 - JUBILEE YEAR, AROUND THE WORLD IN 80 DAYS.

Last December in Rome, Pope Francis launched the Holy Jubilee Year. The tradition of the Jubilee was proclaimed by Pope Boniface VIII in the fourteenth century (1300). It takes place every 25 years, a quarter of a century. Throughout France, parishes and shrines are mobilizing to accompany the faithful in their pilgrimage and conversion process. Thirty-five specific events take place between the opening of the Holy Door in December 2024 and its closure in January 2026. A Catholic "world tour in 80 days" (1).

In the first months of his pontificate in 2013, Pope Francis visited Lampedusa, a Sicilian island symbolic of the reception of exiles who risk their lives to cross the Mediterranean, placing his magisterium (Catholic church's authority or office to give authentic interpretation of the word of God) under the sign of the defence of the rights of migrants. Many NGOs that provide rescue at sea have been warning for years about this deadly migratory route. The Catholic Church in France has created a "Pastoral Care of Migrants" merged in 2020 with the "National Mission and Migration Service (SNMM)", placed under the responsibility of the Episcopal Comm ission for the Universal Mission of the Church (CEMUE). At the Vatican, the Migrants and Refugees Section is personally directed by Pope Francis (2).

In France, the reception of migrants is provided by the services of the State, with the support of numerous associations, which carry out a mission of general interest, in a secular and ecumenical framework. " Catholic Aid " rubs shoulders with general Aid, associations committed since their origins alongside the most vulnerable with Cimade, Gisti, or Utopia 56... wherever the rights of exiles are flouted. A guarantee of secularism has been required to benefit from public subsidies, since the law of 24th August 2021, the aim of which is to strengthen the principles of the Republic by fighting against all forms of separatism (3).

Constitutionally, France is an indivisible, secular, democratic and social Republic that ensures the equality before the law, throughout its territory, of all citizens (4). It respects all beliefs. It organizes the separation of religions and the State, which is neutral with regard to religious or spiritual convictions. There is no state religion. Secularism guarantees freedom of conscience for all. Everyone is free to believe or not to believe. It allows the free expression of one's convictions, with respect for those of others and within the limits of public order. Secularism allows the exercise of citizenship, by reconciling the freedom of each person with the equality and fraternity of all in the concern for the general interest. Based on the 1905 secularism law, it allowed France to put an end to the religious quarrels that have punctuated its history, tragically with the Wars of Religion that bloodied Europe for centuries, and more insidiously during the nineteenth century when the parties of order, viscerally anti-republican, wanted to re-establish institutions that had allowed them to establish a conservative-Church ("royal" Catholic religion) power, Army...

After having been experienced as a "persecution" and after a conflict that lasted 16 years, the Catholic Church and the faithful finally understood and admitted in 1921, the year of reconciliation with the French Republic, that the law of 1905 was both a protection and a bulwark (4). Curiously, during his visit to Ajaccio on December 15, 2024, Pope Francis spread a message of distrust of the French secular model. Pleading in favour of a "healthy secularism," which is "neither static nor fixed, but evolving and dynamic," the Supreme Pontiff repeated a criticism already expressed about French secularism that would suffer from a "colouring inherited from the Enlightenment that is much too strong" demeaning religions, "subcultures."

For Federico Lombardi (6), a specialist in Vatican communication, Pope Francis wants to tackle the "most burning problems of today" with a "uncentered point of view", that of the poor and the peripheries, which would allow him "to broaden the gaze or to welcome with particular intensity critical issues (migrations, prisons, slavery...), to push reflection and the search for concrete solutions to the problems of humanity". His magisterium would be "between continuity and innovation". His criticisms of French secularism are surprising in a country like France, which is home to the largest Jewish and Muslim communities in Europe. Cohabitation between religions is harmonious in the country of Voltaire and Victor Hugo; it is expressed through intense interreligious dialogue and real solidarity, especially when the faithful of a community are attacked or discriminated against (7). Pope Francis did not want to come to the inauguration of Notre Dame on 7th December, 2024, in Paris, preferring to go to Corsica, "an island where 90% of the inhabitants say they are Catholic and where religious practice is fervent and intertwined with political life" (8) to testify to his preference for the "peripheries". Yet Notre-Dame de Paris is "the parish of the Nation", this French singularity expressed by Maryvonne de Saint Pulgent (9) which "may seem disconcerting in a secular republic" because the French, like the Europeans, whether they are believers or not, of Catholic culture or not, "need a place that is part of the long term, a place marked by the sacred, where the nation finds itself".

All men and women of good will are needed to defend an essential cause that goes beyond religious, political or social affiliations, that of exiles. For the defence of migrants' rights, it is a shame to oppose a "centre" to "peripheries". Pope Francis has often denounced the "instrumentalization of religion," still in Corsica. At a time when religious fundamentalisms instrumentalize religion and migration, all over the world, opposing a "supposedly dominating centre" to "oppressed peripheries," the better to attack Western values, is Pope Francis not playing with fire?

Will the 80 days announced to celebrate the Jubilee of 2025 be enough to build bridges and dispel misunderstandings? To illustrate an "enlightened universalism", biting and mocking but full of humanity, we suggest reflecting on the humanist message of the "Chanson pour l'Auvergnat", written by a French composer, rebellious spirit, resolutely secular and republican, George Brassens. He expresses with sad irony that the most decisive and humane help does not always come from "all well-intentioned people" (10).

The road to hell is paved with good intentions...

Some information about the border of the Eastern Pyrenees...

On the border between Spain and France, not so happy scenarios are also being played out...

Coming from the deep south, migrants, exiles without papers, want to cross the border attracted by the " the golden one " of the West... and rub shoulders with the rejection of our migration policies: here too the Police is on all fronts to "protect" our Retailleau-style West... Racial profiling is common in bus and train stations, road checks are frequent, passes are monitored...

Some images take us back to the "Withdrawal " (exodus in 1939 of refugees from the Spanish Civil War)...

But here too solidarity is organized: on the Catalan Mediterranean border, an informal collective "Long live the coast " brings together different movements, associations, on both sides of the border: French, Catalan, Spanish... is organized into groups: observation, guide...

Action/reception, awareness-raising, permanence, support vehicle...

We had the opportunity to participate in one of their meetings and we were given the opportunity to present the situation on the Calais and Dunkirk coasts: the assembly was surprised by the magnitude of the situations, which shows that networking is important to mediatize our struggles outside the media of power... And we also presented Salam's actions: general congratulations for our commitments...

There you have it, this little word to say that we are not alone, that at all borders a network of solidarity exists and that it is only growing: " they shall not pass "!!

Attached are photos of the Caritas premises in Portbou where we were welcomed by Maria Jose: this premise is located near the train station at the foot of the church, it is open every day from 7pm to 8pm, it "offers" food and clothes to the "travellers".

Food for Calais:

JAM and MAYONNAISE, Milk tea and sugar, instant coffee, cookies (or pastries, or cake bars or pound cakes etc...)
